EASTER SUNDAY The Resurrection Of The Lord

Easter is about rebirth. It is about re-creation. It is about new life. It is about the fact that Jesus now invites us to open our hearts to his new Easter power. Easter is about shattering tombs. Jesus wants to give us the power to rise from tombs of darkness after our hope has been washed to pieces. He wants to give us the power to rise from the tomb of discouragement after our love has been rejected. He wants to give us the power to rise from tombs of doubt after our faith has been shaken. This is the good news of Easter.

It is the good news that Jesus shattered His own tomb and rose to the fullness of life - and that He wants to help us rise from our tombs as well. It is the good news that no tomb - no tomb - can hold us anymore, not the tomb of despair, not the tomb of discouragement, not the tomb of doubt, not even the tomb of death.

The central theme of salvation history is survival: first of God's people, Israel, led from slavery to freedom - in the Exodus and Passover; and then of Jesus, the God man and Messiah, overcoming sin and death through His resurrection.

We are constantly reminded that the mystery of Easter points to a very different kind of life... one that speaks not of failure, but of completion.... not of ending, but of a new beginning. We are reminded at our Paschal celebration of the tools that God gives us for the work of this new life.... fire, water, and an empty tomb. When you attend the Easter liturgy, take a few moments to look at the sanctuary in the church... look at the symbols, look at how it is decorated and highlighted: The flame of the Easter Candle, the water of the Baptismal font, and the table where the Risen Lord invites us to break bread with Him - and then rediscover the meaning of His death and resurrection.

The message of Easter is that we are not dead. The Empty Tomb, and not the Cross, is the end, or rather it is the beginning of the Story of New Life. We come together as a community because we accept the responsibility for overcoming evil, and for conquering death in the ways it has invaded our world. We will not stand by and watch God's handiwork be destroyed or spoiled. We will be even stronger signs of faith, hope and love for our families, for our neighbors and friends, for our co workers.

Resurrection faith is a marvelous gift, if we are open to receive it. It can change our lives and lead us to become the forgiving, peace filled people that we are all meant to be.

The shattering of the Tomb should make it impossible for us to continue being comfortable and complacent. Jesus invites us to share his new life - here and now. He offers us the strength to crush old habits of thinking and acting, and He gives us the vision to re-examine all that we do and are in the light of that Easter Dawn. It is this brilliant and undiminished light of Resurrection Faith that the Risen Lord calls us to live.

No one took Jesus from the tomb - but we do know where He is. Proof of the Risen Christ lies within us. We are the proof that Christ is alive and lives with us still. We are His witnesses to all the nations.

CHRIST IS RISEN! HE IS TRULY RISEN!!

The Canlde burns brightly in our sanctuary during all the liturgies celebrated in the Easter Season. After Pentecost, it is positioned at the Baptismal Font where it brings the light of Christ to our Baptismal and Funeral Liturgies, underscoring our belief that in baptism we die with Christ so that we may rise with Him into eternal life.

WHAT IS THE OCTAVE OF EASTER?

The joy of the initial day of Our Lord's Resurrection is celebrated in the Church for eight days, called the Octave of Easter. Liturgically, we celebrate Easter at highest pitch from Easter Sunday to Divine Mercy Sunday. Each day of the Octave is ranked as a Solemnity in the Church's liturgical calendar, the highest ranking of liturgical feasts. At Masses during the Octave of Easter, as on Sundays, the Gloria, is recited or sung. And at the end of each Mass of the Octave, the double Alleluia is sung at the dismissal. The idea of an Octave of a great feast has its roots in the Old Testament. There are many Jewish feasts that lasted for eight days, for example, the feast of Passover and the feast of Tabernacles. In the Catholic Church, we celebrate eight days of Christmas as well as eight days of Easter. If there is any time to go to daily Mass, the Easter Octave is it! The Gospel readings at Masses during the Octave of Easter include passages from the Gospels that relate various appearances of the Risen Jesus. If you can't make it to the daily Mass, reflecting on these Gospel texts is a wonderful way to prolong the celebration of Easter. Each day during the Octave, we proclaim in the Gospel Acclamation: This is the day the Lord has made; let us be glad and rejoice in it. The Octave of Easter ends on the Second Sunday of Easter, the Sunday of Divine Mercy.

WHY ARE EGGS ASSOCIATED WITH EASTER?

On that first Easter morning, Jesus came to life and walked out of the tomb, and left it, as it were, an empty shell. Thus you see that though an egg seems to be as dead as a



stone, yet it really has life in it (the baby chick). This is why eggs are an Easter symbol. In time past, they used to color the eggs red, so as to show the kind of death by which Christ died,-a bloody death.

ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATIONS

Preparations are underway for the annual tradition of honoring those couples in our Archdiocese who will be celebrating and fifty years of Christian marriage in the year 2022. These anniversary liturgy will be celebrated by Joseph Cardinal Tobin in the Cathedral Basilica of the



Sacred Heart in Newark. Since there were no celebrations in 2020 and 2021 any couple who would have celebrated their Gold Anniversary in those years can participate as well.

For fifty year anniversaries the liturgy will be celebrated on May 15th at 3:00PM (must register by May 6th) Please call the parish office to register.

ARCHDIOCESE OF NEWARK - ANNUAL APPEAL 2022

The Archdiocese's 2022 Annual Appeal is currently underway. You may have already received at home a letter from Cardinal Tobin explaining the important role the Annual Appeal plays for our Archdiocese. Gifts to the Annual Appeal play a critical role in the delivery of programs and ministries provided by the Archdiocese that are at the heart of the mission of our local Church.

Your gift will assist passing on the faith, ministries that proclaim the Gospel, care for the Poor and Vulnerable, forming future priests and supporting retired clergy.

To Date, 119 families from our parish family have generously supported the Appeal: Our Parish's Goal - \$34,000 -- Paid To Date - \$21,562 (63.42% of Goal)

Your generosity not only supports all the ministries listed above but can also be a direct support for our parish as well. If we exceed our parish goal in paid pledges by June 30th, like we did last year thanks to your generosity, we will receive a rebate from the Archdiocese of all the excess funds and a 2% reduction in our parish assessment expense for the fiscal year. This 2% reduction saved the parish more than \$6,900 in assessment expense last year. The Archdiocese also rebated back to the parish \$9,848.70 in excess funds received from our parish! It's a great way for our parish family to "fund raise" and help others at the same time. Thank you so much to all who have supported the Annual Appeal by giving a gift!!

Reminder, we must collect our Parish's Goal in paid gifts by June 30th. If we don't accomplish this, the shortfall will be added as an expense to our budget and must be paid to the Archdiocese and we will not receive the 2% reduction in our assessment expense.

SYMBOLS OF FAITH WHY IS THE BUTTERFLY A SYMBOL OF THE RESURRECTION?

Known for its lightness, the fluttering of its wings, and especially its metamorphosis from a caterpillar into something more beautiful and powerful, the butterfly symbolizes the resurrection of Jesus Christ. The butterfly has long been a Christian symbol of the resurrection, for it disappears into a cocoon and appears dead, but emerges later far more beautiful and powerful than before. The three stages of the butterfly's metamorphoses are symbolic of the three

stages in the life cycle of Christ and the Christian. The caterpillar's non-stop eating reminds us of normal earthly life where people are often preoccupied with taking care of their physical needs. The caterpillar's life also reminds us of Jesus' life on earth. Caterpillars then "entomb" themselves in what appears to be lifeless cocoons portraying the crucifixion and burial of Jesus and the death of all humans. The third and final stage is the appearance of a butterfly with jewel-colored wings and the ability to soar, which represents the resurrection into a new and glorious life free of material concerns and restrictions.

A major theme in St. Paul's teachings is that "we shall all be changed" (Behold, I tell you a mystery. We shall not all fall asleep, but we will all be changed, in an instant, in the blink of an eye, at the last trumpet. For the trumpet will sound, the dead will be raised incorruptible, and we shall be changed. 1 Cor. 15:51-52). The Christian hope is that what is sown in the grave as a weak mortal body will be raised an indestructible



spiritual body not subject to temptation, sorrow, death, or pain (*So also is the resurrection of the dead. It is sown corruptible; it is raised incorruptible. It is sown dishonorable; it is raised glorious. It is sown weak; it is raised powerful. It is sown a natural body; it is raised a spiritual body. If there is a natural body, there is also a spiritual one. 1 Cor. 15:42-44). Through death the spirit will escape – not from its body but from the vulnerabilities and hardships of mortal flesh.*

What better symbol of the Resurrection — an inanimate object out of which comes life. Butterflies are the perfect symbol of the tomb Christ conquered and every Christian's hope of their own rebirth.
